Competencies used to develop content in each section of the Library Research Handbook:

1. Background: Where do you want to go?

- Awareness of appropriate sources from a variety of formats appropriate to discipline
- Integrate their own ideas with those of others using supporting evidence
- Identify issues around creation and dissemination of information

2. Planning: Research Question and Topic

- Design realistic plan and timeline.
- Formulate, focus, and revise topic.
- Gather background on unfamiliar topics.

3. Finding Your Way: Searching and Sources

- Select appropriate sources from a variety of formats appropriate to the discipline
- Efficiently utilize a variety of information retrieval systems appropriate to the discipline
- Construct and implement an effective search strategy
- Assess the quantity, quality, and relevance of results. Determine if the search strategy should be revised or if other sources, possibly non-library sources should be searched.
- Identify gaps in the information retrieved
- Differentiate between types of sources retrieved and cited. Understand the elements and correct syntax of a citation for a wide range of resources.

4. Evaluating: What did you find?

- Articulate and apply criteria for evaluating both the information and its sources.
- Evaluate sources for point of view or bias.
- Determine whether information retrieved satisfied the research need.
- Extract and synthesis concepts and themes from sources gathered

5. Putting It All Together: Writing and Citing

- Understand academic honesty and use methods to avoid plagiarism
- Determine new knowledge and unique characteristics of information. Construct new concepts with supporting evidence.
- Communicate information effectively with an awareness of intended audience and conventions of format and structure.

6. Where Do You Want to Go Next? Reflection

- Reflect on information gathering, evaluation and communication process/writing. Identify success and failures in order to improve future research/communication
